Jamie, Melissa and I have enjoyed every moment with this lively, creative, loving group. We are grateful to you for entrusting us with your treasures. Each year as I sit down to write the last newsletter article of the year, I struggle to avoid the obvious clichés. I usually fail. That's because I really can't believe this is the last newsletter and the year is coming to an end. We really do love your precious children. It really has been amazing to watch them grow and blossom. It truly has been a wonderful year. While true, the clichés simply cannot capture the profoundly meaningful experience of sharing a year—in some cases, two—with a group of preschoolers.

It is difficult to sum up our year. We have had a rollicking good time learning through play. It has been such fun to watch as, bit by bit, the group took over ownership of their environment. As their play became increasingly social, role-based and complex, they enthusiastically embraced the tools of literacy, math, and fine motor skills to further their own goals. Don't want zombies to bother you? Make a sign and

define a perimeter. Want to distribute the train cars fairly? Count them up and divide them equally. No phone to call the doctor? Get some construction paper and make one.

The small size of our class this year has added to the closeness of our community. With only 10 students, the children had no choice but to learn to get along with everyone in the group. It has been lovely to watch as they have learned to respect each other's differences, to seek their peers out for their strengths, and to gently accommodate their weak spots. We have seen them develop empathy, trust, and problem-solving skills. Even more miraculously, they have begun to use these skills to help each other understand their friends' points of view.

The children love taking turns to perform our class jobs. They eagerly check the board each day to see if they might be the Line Leader, Pointer, Weather Reporter, Pattern Maker, or Letter Builder. Even if they don't have one of the rotating jobs that day, though, they know that everyone's job, every day, is to be a good friend. I am so pleased to report that they have all learned to do that job effectively!

It is so difficult to say goodbye. Looking at our young friends, though, we can see that they are truly ready to take their next steps, whether in kindergarten or in the Fives class. We are grateful for our time together, and we are grateful to all of you for your support. It has been a very special experience for Melissa and me. There I go again with the clichés. I have so much to say that I cannot adequately express with words. You and your children are 2 Cool 2 Be 4 Gotten. Have a great summer!

I think that providing joy in the classroom is one of Mushroom's core values. This core value seemed even more present while preparing for our school musical, "The Waterhole." There were so many levels of joy present while preparing for the musical as well as presenting the musical. There were many opportunities to experience joy for the children, the teachers and the families.

It seems that the theme this year for my newsletter editions is to share articles that inspire me. So, in honor of my theme, I would like to share an article written about the value of joy in the classroom.

Joy in the Early Childhood Programs, By Bev Bos

Children are egocentric—all of you know that. They do not have to be told they are wonderful because they are born

knowing they are. They are born with an inherent self that is intellectual, complete, an inherent self that can dance, sing, write poetry and tell stories, and has a sense of delight and joy in all things. Inherently, children are born to take risks and grow to their optimum. Inherently, children have a sense of joy about learning, growing and doing.

The word joy will probably not show up in a curriculum guide. But, those of us working hard to ensure a childhood for so many children know that if we did not hear laughter, giggling, hoopla, shouting and cheering in our centers we couldn't go on. It is the JOY of each child that keeps us doing what we do.

Every August, we have a conference at our school and teachers come from all over to be with us. After the workshop was over this year, I was sitting on the porch talking to Zachary Bos, who is four and a half. I talked about the conference and all the people who came, and I said: "Zac, what do you think they thought?" He said: "I think they thought I was pretty amazing." What joy Zac finds in what he does. He was not impressed with how hard I worked, just how hard he played.

Katie and Gus were swinging in the swings side by side when Katie said to Gus: "Isn't it great to be my friend, Gus?" What joy children find in themselves and in each moment.

Children are so present. It is this moment that is important to a child. Adults think about tomorrow, next week and vacations next summer. Children can find joy in each moment and in little things that adults throw away or overlook.

Today at school, on one of the tables, I put out 12 plastic mixing bowls. I also put out salt, flour and warm water. You have never seen so many different mixtures called play dough. Of course, the children added food coloring in varied amounts, and I witnessed colors I have never seen before. Elena spent 65 minutes mixing and stirring. Hers was a kind of quiet joy. Matthew mixed and stirred and added and decided to leave his until tomorrow to see if it would be "okay" after resting. His was kind of a resigned joy – he liked doing it but it didn't exactly turn out the way he expected.

A sense of joy in a children's center can be quiet, loud, gentle and fun. A sense of joy can be heard, smelled and tasted when children make food. It can be muddy and dirty when children work in the garden and when they dig holes. It can be wet and slippery when the hose is out. It can be blue, red, yellow, purple, brown, black and orange when children do art. A sense of joy can be found in the aching tiredness at the end of the day for children, teachers and parents who have spent their day together.

We have experienced so much JOY with your children this school year. There are so many moments throughout the year

that have brought joy to the children as well as to us. So, thank you for supporting us as we have worked to set the foundation for your children to know that learning and growing are meant to be joyful!

I will leave you with a quote from my latest favorite book, "Teach like Finland: 33 Simple Strategies for Joyful Classrooms." – "There's an old Finnish saying," Holappa said. "Those things you learn without joy you will forget easily."
