Looking through the eyes of a three-year-old is a wonderful way to experience each and every day.

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#### PARKING LOT SAFETY REMINDERS



- Drive slowly and carefully, especially when backing out, and be observant of the cars and people around you.
- Stay alert and keep kids close to you when walking in the lot.

- Please observe the handicapped parking spots.
- Don't leave other children unattended in your vehicle or in the lot.

We spent the month of November focusing on Family, Feast and Me. We decorated our bulletin board by making faces out of paper plates. We looked into the mirror to determine what color of eyes and hair we had. We then placed the faces around a huge Thanksgiving table. The students were also



given the opportunity to draw pictures of their family and discuss each member. We counted the number of family members who live in our houses. We also shared with our classmates what type of activities we like to do with our families.

Communication skills were our small group focus for the month. The children practiced asking and answering questions using complete sentences. They were also encouraged to bring in a special item from home to share with the class. They enjoyed talking about their item and learning more about what their friends were sharing.

We spent a lot of time baking for our feast. The goal this year was to make as many different types of muffins as possible. Of course, we had to sample each and every kind. The children shared ideas of what they were thankful for. They also listened to several books on Thanksgiving, Native Americans and Pilgrims.

We ended November with a fabulous feast shared by family and friends. The children put on a musical performance that brought the house down. It was a great month.

As we enter into the month of December, we will be focusing on kindness. Our goal will be to conduct 10 Random Acts of Kindness in three weeks. Can we do it? Stay tuned for next month's newsletter to find out.

## News from the 3/4s class from Liz and Sheila...

W e hope everyone had a wonderful Thanksgiving!

In November our theme was "We Gather Together." We explored the many ways people come together to help each other and to celebrate. This group especially loves our daily

Gathering ritual. With Thanksgiving on the horizon, November was the perfect time for us to extend the concept!

We began with a look at family, a child's first group experience. We learned a little bit about each other—who has a brother, who has a sister, etc.—and shared what makes our own families special. The children already have a sense of their family identity, and were able to share what they like to do together. We observed that there are many ways to be a family, but all families love each other and help each other. We have extended the family concept to school, and we talk about the "Mushroom Family" we share. They are really starting to care for each other and help each other!

Food is an important part of many gatherings, especially at Thanksgiving. We learned the importance of choosing a variety of fruits and vegetables to "eat a rainbow." We enjoyed working together to prepare corn muffins, pumpkin no-bake cookies, and frozen fruit salad for our families.

Sharing is an important part of any gathering, and we reinforced the concept in many ways throughout the month. For many children, starting preschool marks the first time they are

confronted with the need to share. This new concept includes several components which can be tricky to master. Children may initially feel that "You need to share" means, "Give up the thing you want." While sharing does mean that you can't always have everything you want



right this minute, we stress that sharing is a positive way to respect the rights of all and to make sure everyone gets what they need.

Unlike the home environment, at school the materials belong to everyone. If someone is using a toy, we must ask for a turn rather than grabbing. We tell the children that grabbing hurts, and grabbing makes someone want to hold on even tighter. Often a polite request is met with success. Even when children ask, they may not get what they want right away. We model for the children "When I'm finished, you can have a turn" as a respectful way to defer a request.

Another challenging principle of sharing is that monopolizing a resource is generally unfair. With a giant mound of play dough



on the table, there should be enough for several children to play at the same time. On the other hand, sometimes a child has a particular vision which requires the temporary use of all of a certain material. In that case, we might help explain the child's important plan to the other children. This sometimes leads to several children or even the entire group supporting their friend's idea and helping to make the plan a reality. Cooperative effort can be very satisfying! Although there is no "one size fits all" procedure to cover every situation, we remain focused on teaching the children to interact in ways that respect others while getting their own needs met. Through repeated experiences, children learn that, rather than threatening them, sharing protects their interests overall.



We found many ways this month for the children to experience the positive, pleasurable, additive aspects of sharing. For instance, we played a game in which each child had a bowlful of one type of paper fruit. We encouraged the children to share some of their

fruit with others. They were thrilled both to give and to receive, and discovered that when everyone gave a little, we all had more. We made beautiful fruit salads!

Sharing enriches children's lives in many ways. When we share a ball, we can play catch. When we share the train tracks, we can build a really big track to enjoy together. When we all help cut the paper vegetables, we can enjoy a heaping pot of soup. When we trade markers, we get to use more colors. Waiting for your turn to hold Talking Turtle and share your news means that everyone listens to you, too. A child who creates a drawing and decides to give it to a friend experiences the warm feelings of generosity along with her friend's gratitude.

November is a great time to focus on being thankful for what we have. We endeavored to be mindful throughout the month of the many wonderful people, things, and experiences that enrich our lives. Although "thankful" may be a new word for an abstract concept, it is really just putting a name on what the children naturally feel. In that spirit, we set about planning our biggest sharing project of the month: a feast to share with our families. The food we prepared, the decorations we made, and the entertainment we provided were the children's gifts to you, offered in the spirit of generosity and gratitude. We hope you enjoyed our little feast!



**Dress for Success!** Now that the weather is getting colder we would like to request that you send your children in appropriate outdoor clothing: warm coat, hat, mittens, snow pants, and boots when necessary. **Items should be labeled and** 

placed in the child's bag. The children go outside every day, weather permitting — no rain and a temperature of 28 degrees or higher. Please be sure your kids also have proper "play shoes" (especially on movement day). Thank you!

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Next month we will try to make our classroom a low key respite from the excitement of the holiday season. Our theme will be "Colors, Lights and Shapes of the Season."

## News from the 4s class from Liz, Kim, and Amy...

M e hope you all had a wonderful Thanksgiving!

Our theme for November was "We Gather Together." We focused on food, gratitude, generosity, manners, and kindness. Our own daily Gathering gives us a chance to connect with each other in an atmosphere of respect and acceptance. Everyone has something to say! Throughout the month we prepared for a very special gathering: a feast for our families. We began by figuring out what we would need to do to make a terrific party. After making our plan we set about inviting, cooking, decorating, and rehearsing. Our projects provided plenty of opportunities to enjoy the pleasures of cooperative effort. We hope you enjoyed the results!

We also continued to highlight a different letter each week. During F week, we included a fire safety lesson. Through dramatic play, we practiced what to do in an emergency situation. After getting to a safe location, we called 911 to report the emergency. We learned that firefighters can figure out where you are if you give them your address. We had plenty of volunteers for our fire department! We also had a real fire drill and practiced going to our safe place outside Mushroom. F week also brought activities related to family and feast preparations.

During V week everyone brought in vegetables and we created a delicious vegetable soup. The children did a great job cutting up the vegetables and working together. We met *The Hungry Thing,* a monster who speaks in rhymes. We enjoyed figuring out what he wanted to eat when he asked for schmancakes, tickles, or pamburgers. We were inspired to create our own class book of silly food rhymes.

T week was all about turkeys. We created original handprint turkey stories fashioned after *Setting the Turkeys Free*. The Parrot Tico Tango, a different type of T bird, taught us a lesson about sharing. When everyone shared a little of what they had,



we created beautiful and delicious fruit salads, both real and pretend. Of course, this provided a great opportunity to practice polite phrases such as "Yes, please," "No, thank you," and "Would you like some raspberries?" It was clear from the children's responses that the pleasure of giving nearly equaled the pleasure of getting!

Our theme for December will be "Colors, Shapes, and Lights of the Season." We hope that December will be a peaceful and joyous month for all of you.

## News from the Pre-K classes from Cara, Jane, and Melanie...

The traditions we hold for our families are so important for our children as they give them a sense of security, a way to mark the rhythm of time passing and bring about a sense of joy. I find that when there is a certain smell in the air, it can trigger a vivid memory from my childhood, which instantly gives me a sense of peace and happiness.

In the classroom, I find it equally important to have traditions and rituals to provide that sense of security, a rhythm to the



day and a way to celebrate with each other. These can be from our goodbye ritual of having Snowy the Owl say goodbye to us, the song we dance to before gathering and the way we celebrate each other's birthdays. We have our own sense of community and culture within our class-

room. The children's sense of being attached to something outside of our classroom rests as well in the traditions we hold as a school.

The feast we hold every November in each class is a wonderful example of a tradition that adds to the richness of our children's experience at Mushroom. It may look different in each class, but it marks a passage of time and connects us to the larger community of the school. As we prepared for the feast, we discussed what ways they prepare for a celebration. Even though many of us might celebrate different holidays (or even differently within the same holiday), we all have similar things we do to prepare for the celebration such as preparing food, preparing our house with decorations and dressing up for these special occasions, etc.

#### Illness: When to Keep Your Child Home

While fever is a good indication of sickness, it is not the only one. If your child is "not himself," has vomited or had diarrhea within the last 24 hours, has a green nasal discharge, or is tired and irritable, something more than a cold is likely to blame. In addition to potentially infecting others, children are also less resistant to other germs when ill. If you have any doubts, it's best to have the child stay home. Of course, a big way to help prevent illness is to make sure children wash their hands upon entering the classroom every day.

These discussions begin to expand the children's worlds, helping them realize that they are the same as their classmates and also there are differences, which are all acceptable! We had the pleasure of learning more about Diwali this month as well as the Native American culture. The feast soup we prepared was called Three Sisters soup, which we learned is made from the important crops of corn, beans and squash that grow together. Each crop has its function and works together to create a rich soil and the right conditions to grow and flourish. It sounds a lot like our children as they flourish in the soil of "individual growth in a shared environment."

As we move into December and the days grow shorter, we will now concentrate on answering the question of why this seasonal change happens, and learn more about our nocturnal animal friends.

#### News from the K-Too classes from Marilyn...

In November, K-Too prepared homemade bread and vegetable soup for our feast, learned to write and conceptualize fractions through experiential use of balance scale and measuring cups/spoons, created a play with set and costumes from Esphyr Slobodkina's book *The Wonderful Feast*, learned the origins and history of Thanksgiving, and wrote what we are thankful for. Our feast was a great success. The children loved performing a play for their families, took pride in the soup and bread they made, and savored some healthy competition during rhyming bingo. Everyone had a wonderful time.

In December and January we will explore various cultures' holidays: Ramadan, Diwali, Christmas, Hanukkah, and Kwanzaa. Each holiday includes light and caring which we will experience through mock classroom "celebrations" and discussion. The religious details of the holidays will be referenced, but not elaborated on. The children will make a special holiday gift this month and talk about giving.

Also, in December, if there is enough snow, we will study the water cycle and volumetric/weight principles. In January we will begin our electric house project.
