

News from the 4s class from Liz and Marilyn...

le hope you had a wonderful Thanksgiving! Our theme for November was "We Gather Together." We explored ideas such as healthy food, manners, celebration, sharing, cooperation, and gratitude. Much of this brief month was spent combining those concepts to create a feast for our families. We baked cookies, sliced fruit for fruit salad, practiced songs, created decorations, and contemplated what we are thankful for. We were touched by the children's earnest desire to create a wonderful feast experience for their families. We hope you enjoyed the results!

We enjoyed making books this month. We had fun using the binding machine to create our own spooky stories in October, and in November we used the machine to create two collaborative books. Our first book was based on The Hungry Thing, the story of a monster who speaks in rhymes. After the story, the Hungry Thing made a personal appearance in our classroom. We enjoyed figuring out what he wanted to eat when he asked for schmancakes, tickles, or

pamburgers. We were inspired to create our own class book of silly food rhymes. We also wrote and illustrated a book about the things we are thankful for. Some children were inspired to make even more books of their own, so we showed them how to make books using a few sheets of paper and a stapler.

The Parrot Tico Tango taught us a lesson about sharing. When everyone shared a little of what they had, we created beautiful and delicious fruit salads, both real and pretend. Of course, this provided a great opportunity to practice polite phrases such as "Yes, please," "No, thank, you," and "Would you like some raspberries?" It was clear from the children's responses that the pleasure of giving nearly equaled the pleasure of getting!

In addition to cutting real and pretend fruit, we found other opportunities this month to work on cutting skills. Often we will cut and decorate the letter of the day, paying close attention to the geometric aspects of the letter. Symmetrical letters are especially fun. When paper is folded along the line of symmetry, a few cuts can make the letter appear. We also cut pictures of food from magazines to create collages of dinner

plates and smaller dessert plates. We thought about what foods we enjoy, noticing that everyone is different. We also thought about what foods should be enjoyed freely, and which should be enjoyed in moderation.

Our daily journal time has developed into a pleasant social routine for most of the children. We have noticed that they enjoy sharing ideas with each other during this activity. Those children who were already interested in exploring writing and drawing have helped pass that interest along to their peers. We love seeing how much they are learning from each other! Many of the children have filled the first volume of their jour-

> nals, so we used the binding machine once again to make new journals.

Imaginative play continues to be the main focus during center time. We are seeing advances in the group's play in terms of complexity, coordination, and cooperation. It has been exciting to see two or three groups of children working on different play scenarios, but interacting with each other. When one group builds a castle, they might need supplies for a party they are planning. They might then visit

another group's grocery store to buy food. This group has many wonderful ideas of their own. We are happy to take the role of facilitators, helping them advance their own play.

Our theme for December will be "Colors, Lights and Shapes of the Season." We hope that December will be a peaceful and joyous month for all of you.

News from the Pre-K classes from Cara, Jane, Melanie and Marikate...

le began this month by asking the question, "Where does our food come from?" We had several wonderful ideas that ranged from the grocery store, to farms, to the gardens in our backyard. We read stories about farms and how they produce our food, be it fruits, vegetables, protein or dairy products. We made it real in our classroom by turning the dramatic play area into a farmers market, as we first explored fruits and vegetables.

"play shoes" (especially on movement day). Thank you!





We then turned our attention to how food is important to celebrations and specifically to our Harvest Feast. First, we decided we needed to make sure to create an invitation for our family and friends. After our invitation went home, we moved right into making placemats for the feast, necklaces to wear and learning songs to sing as part of our celebration. The dramatic play area then morphed into a restaurant while we were in the midst of preparing for our feast.

We read the book Pilgrim Cat and were introduced to a Pilgrim girl named Faith, her cat named Pounce and an important Native American named Squanto. The children learned that Squanto showed the Pilgrims how to plant corn since this was not a crop they were familiar with and it allowed them to have a bounty of food at the next harvest. We discussed how there were not grocery stores at that time to purchase food, which

made it even more important that they learn how to grow bountiful crops.



the "Three Sisters" soup. It is part of Native American teachings to grow the three crops of corn, beans and squash together. Each crop has its function and they work together to create a rich soil and the right conditions to grow and flourish. It sounds a lot like our children as they flourish in the soil of "individual growth in a shared environment."

We had a wonderful Harvest Feast with our families, and enjoyed coming together for the special songs we learned in music and to share a meal. Together we "filled up our bucket!"

In December, we will extend our exploration of Native Americans as we learn about dream catchers. This leads into our investigation of day and night. Time to get out the telescopes!

News from the K-Too classes from Marilyn...

n November the K-Too children created their own map of Pittsburgh with PNC Park, Heinz Field, Consol Energy Center, the Pittsburgh Zoo, Phipps Conservatory, Kennywood, Carnegie Science Center, the Fort Pitt and Liberty Tunnels, and their street in Mt. Lebanon or Upper St. Clair marked with symbols. The maps also included a numbered key. The children loved them and now can help parents find their way on family trips!

In November we also prepared homemade bread and vegetable soup for our feast, learned to write and conceptualize fractions through hands-on cooking with measuring cups/spoons, created a play



with set and costumes from Esphyr Slobodkina's book The Wonderful Feast, learned the origins and history of Thanksgiving, and wrote what we are thankful for.

Our feast was a great success. The children loved performing a play for their families, took pride in the food they made, and savored healthy competition during rhyming bingo. Everyone had a wonderful time. Thank you to all of the parents who volunteered to make this event a success: Toni Sorsdal and Amy Spector for assisting with soup preparation; Renee Gebben and Mandy Mitchell for setup and pictures in the AM; Amy Garces and Judit Andrews for setup and pictures in the PM.

In December and January we will explore various cultures' holidays: Ramadan, Diwali, Chinese New Year, Christmas, Hanukkah, and Kwanzaa. Each holiday includes light and caring which we will experience through mock classroom "celebrations" and discussion. The religious details of the holidays will be referenced, but not elaborated on. The children will make a special holiday gift this month and talk about giving. Also, if there is enough snow, we'll study the water cycle and volumetric/weight principles. In January we will begin our electric house project.
