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### News from the 3s class from Jamie. Debbie. and Melissa...

nce upon a time there was an enchanted Mushroom school that was filled with 18 good guys and gals. They battled the Big Bad Wolf on numerous occasions and were brave enough to protect our school. This group included smart princesses, brave knights and fire-breathing dragons. We won our battles through kindness and cooperation. We all lived happily ever after!

One of my favorite themes we discuss is Fairy Tales and Make-Believe. The children have wonderful expressions on their fac-



es listening to these stories. They realize that fairy tales always have good guys and bad guys. We cheered on the good guys and hoped for the happy ending. The students learned how to identify specific characters. We made predictions on how the story would end. We answered comprehension questions to strengthen our reading skills.

We even created our own fairy tales by writing stories.

The students strengthened their writing skills by working in small groups on drawing shapes and writing numbers and letters. They practiced writing the letters in their name and even spelled additional words. The students also strengthened their skills by playing with the play dough, using the lacing cards, picking up small objects and beading necklaces.

Social skills were strengthened this month by participating in partner activities. The students are now creating their own imaginary play and including their classmates. I enjoyed listening to them take on roles such as a plumber, doctor, mommy, daddy or cooker.

We spent several weeks in February learning about the Chinese New Year. We were able to create a dragon with the students in the entire school. 
### News from the 4s class from Liz and Marilyn...

I hat do fairy tales and engineering have in common? **V** Quite a lot, we discovered this month! We carried the children's interest in building and engineering into our Fairy Tales and Make-Believe theme in February. We built houses like the three pigs, explored different kinds of bridges that the billy goats might have crossed, and designed new chairs for Baby Bear. We learned a lot about how the properties of building materials and the shapes we used affected a structure's strength and function.

We also read many different versions of these familiar tales. In

one fractured fairy tale, three javelinas outsmart a wily coyote. We imagined what houses made of tumbleweeds, saguaro sticks, and adobe bricks would be like. We designed houses using unconventional materials and described what they might be like. We imagined sticky candy houses, bouncy marshmallow houses, and soft cotton ball houses.

Our junk collection continued to provide inspiration for our many building projects. We tried constructing bridges that would support the weight of even the biggest plastic billy goat. We have noticed



that as the children gain more experience with these types of projects, they are able to look at their constructions critically and come up with potential solutions more readily. They are learning, too, that each step in the building process teaches us something. Rather than getting upset when a structure fails, they begin thinking about why it failed, and what might fix it.

We also had fun acting out the classic fairy tales and coming up with our own, original fairy tales.

We had a chance to join with Miss Jamie's and Miss Cara's classes this month. It was great to see our class not only take a nurturing role with the slightly younger children, but also learn from the older children. We are looking forward to our dragon parade in March!

March will be a busy month for us. We will have a dragon parade for Chinese New Year on March 2. Open House will be March 6. Conferences are March 20. with salt, ice and warm water to see what caused the ice to melt. The best part of doing these science experiments is letting the children take ownership of the process. I love seeing them choose how to explore the materials and coming up with



their own observations. We decided that next year it would be important to add a thermometer so be able to observe the temperature changes. We worked collaboratively with Miss Jamie's class creating "Frozen" paintings with the colors of blue, white, purple and silver. The children were excited to

learn that at the end of *The Snow Queen* story, the ice in Kai's heart was melted by his friend Gerda's tears. They were able to connect that the salt and warmth from her tears would have caused the ice to melt!

We began to explore the heart more in depth as we neared our holiday of love – Valentine's Day. We spent time looking at the emotive side of the heart as well the physical side. We learned that the heart is a muscle and pumps blood to the rest of our body. We turned the dramatic play area into a doctor's office, which has been a hub bub of activity. This dramatic play has really created a wonderful magic in the classroom and engaged the children with all of their senses. When we asked the children what they knew about the heart at the beginning of our discoveries, many of the children spoke of how to show love with their heart.:) So, we also talked a lot about how we experience love. As preparation for our Valentine's Day celebration we read a poem:

The Queen of Hearts, she made some tarts on a winter's day;
The Knight of Hearts, he stole the tarts and took them clean away.
The King of Hearts called for the tarts and scolded the Knight full sore.
The Knight of Hearts brought back the tarts and vowed he'd steal no more.

We then celebrated with a Queen and King of Hearts tea party. The children made their own red capes and crowns, and were treated to a delicious tea party of pink lemonade, cherry tarts, fairy bread and fruit cups. They had a grand time exchanging their valentines with each other in their decorated bags!

So, what does one do with several large boxes and some imagination? Well, our class worked with all of the classes to make a dragon for all of Mushroom children to dance with to celebrate the Chinese New Year! The Chinese New Year begins with the New Moon on the first day of the new year and ends

on the full moon 15 days later. The 15th day is called the Lantern Festival, which is celebrated at night with lantern displays and children carrying lanterns in a parade. The highlight of the festival is also the dragon dance. While we didn't dance at nighttime, our class made red paper lanterns and drums to along with our dragon. We joined with all of our Mushroom classes to parade our dragon for families, and at the end exclaimed to all "Gung hai fat choy!" This means "Happy new year!" in Chinese.

We will kick off the month of March by celebrating Dr. Seuss's birthday and Read Across America on March 2. We will then move into our investigation of the moon and outer space. We find inspiration for our exploration by learning more about Vincent Van Gogh and his wonderful painting Starry Night.

### News from the K-Too classes from Marilyn...

ebruary was all too short, and therefore a busy month. We ended our world holiday studies with Ramadan. The children wrote about their favorite world holiday: either Diwali, Ramadan, Hanukkah, Chinese New Year, or Kwanzaa.

The children were very interested in how many of the holidays we studied were celebrated according to the lunar calendar rather than the solar calendar. We investigated and learned about the history of time measurement and prediction starting with the Egyptians. Each child made a solar calendar diagram with the Earth orbiting the sun in 12 numbered positions with month names. Months were labeled with the number of days in each. The lunar orbit was added with days as well. Of course, to make it "Mushroomie," we added glitter and a little paint!

We also celebrated Valentine's Day with homemade valentine bags decorated with hearts of different sizes to make animals, wrote about what love is in our journals, composed a poem in a pop-up Valentine for our families, and had class Valentine parties. We concluded February with a study of Benjamin Franklin and his discovery of electricity.

March will be a continuation of our electricity unit: the subatomic world, the physics of electricity, electricity experiments, dismantling electric appliances, and the construction of a low voltage (1.5v) home for a little Mushroom mouse. The children will do the wiring themselves and are very excited. Look for our houses to be on display at the end of the month!

### Children's Vision Screening

### To The Parents:

During the screening, the technician will stand about three feet away from the child while holding the PlusOptix photo-screener. The camera will take a dozen sets of pictures and immediately calculate results. PlusOptix camera is testing for *visual acuity* and *muscle balance*, and another separate test will detect *color discrimination* 



As the technician will know the results immediately, your child will be sent home the day of the screening with a Parent Letter notifying you of your child's vision. If your child is referred, you will receive a follow-up packet of information within the ten days after the screening.

### We vision screen because:

- ~ 1 in every 20 children have an undetected vision problem.
- ~ Amblyopia (lazy eye) affects 1 in 50 children. With early detection and treatment by the age of 3, a child can expect a 95% correction rate; however, if left untreated until the age of 7, the correction rate drops to a mere 5%.
- ~ Correcting a child's vision within early years of school can improve behavior, grades, and performance in general life.

Watch for signs that your child might have a vision problem:

- ~ eyes that cross, turn in or out, or move independently of one another—all of the time, part of the time, or when the child is tired
- ~ closing an eye or covering it, squinting, frowning, blinking, rubbing, or squeezing the eyes trying to see, or even turning the head to use one eye.
- ~ holding reading or writing materials in unusual positions, or tripping and stumbling excessively.
- ~ complaining of eye pain, headaches, nausea, blurriness or inability to see, or words that 'move' or 'jump.'

If you notice any of these symptoms in your child, or anything else that makes you suspicious of your child's vision, do not delay in calling your eye care professional to make an appointment.
