News from the 3s class from Jamie, Debbie, and Christine...

ave you ever read a good book that included laugh-outloud laughter, tear-jerking emotion and characters so interesting that their dialogue kept you thoroughly entertained? You become so invested in this story that a feeling of sadness overcomes you as you reach the final chapter. This scenario completely describes our feelings about our 18 students and our experiences this school year.

I recall the first day of school. The students entered the class-room with excitement on their faces but uncertainty in their hearts. Their teachers were strangers to them and most of their peers were just children sharing the same space. When I observe the children now, their expressions and actions have completely changed. They continue to be excited about school but have confidence in their hearts. They can't wait to share a story with their teachers and are concerned if one of us is absent. They like to snuggle with us, hug us, sit on our laps or just gently grab our hands. They are comfortable with us and know we care deeply for them. Those peers who were viewed as just sharing space have now turned into true friends...friends who like to play, share stories and just have fun with each other.

This year we used our five senses to experience the wonders of fall. We learned about magnets, magnifying glasses, buildings and animals in our Science Center. We read more books than I can even count. We discovered the pure joy in searching for a million worms in a huge mud puddle. The



children became princesses, knights, firefighters and dragons. We used our imaginations to create stories and listened attentively to the interesting fairy tales. We love that the good guys always win and have learned to be assertive and look the troll in the eye.

We know that at the end of the day the most important thing is to be kind to others. We showed this over and over again by collecting supplies for the soldiers, collecting coins for Children's Hospital, baking cookies for the teachers, drawing pictures for a cancer ward, collecting school supplies for children in Africa and gathering cans of food for the homeless.

The kindness shown by our families was overwhelming. We are grateful for the support we received from our parents this school year. We will miss you as much as your children!

Like all good books our final chapter is coming to an end. We will never forget the 18 students who have touched our hearts forever. We will continue to watch them grow and hope that in some way we have made a positive impact on their lives, if in no other way than igniting the love of learning that will continue to grow for many years.

News from the 3/4s class from Liz, Marlene, and Brian...

During April we focused on the concept of "community." We looked at how groups of people (towns, families, classrooms) work together to meet each other's needs. We enjoyed excellent participation from our students' families in this exploration. We learned that everyone in a community, including children and animals, can make a contribution.

We learned about some interesting tools people use with our "Job in a Bag" assignment. With the help of a parent, each child selected a tool to bring in and share with the class. This was a great chance for the children to learn about what their

own parents do, as well as to learn about what others do.

We also had several parents join us as special guests in April. These brave volunteers each gave a presentation to the class about their work.

Chef Luke joined us for a fabulous cooking project. He also taught us about the important contribution our local farmers make. Medical Laboratory Technician Erika taught us about red and white blood cells. She presented a surprisingly exciting video that showed a white blood cell chasing down and gobbling up a bacterium. She gave us a lab coat and some test tubes to keep for dramatic play.

Lieutenant Abe came in uniform to teach us about flying air-to-air refueling missions. We learned the lingo ("Roger," "Affirmative," "Negative"), created our own call signs, and saw video of actual refueling missions. We had fun pretending to fly a jet with the poster Abe provided, which shows the cockpit controls. Abe also left us with pilot wings, pencils, and air-planes for each child, too.

Front Desk Manager George taught us how things work at a hotel. We learned that in a hotel you can get ice cream delivered right to your door! We learned how to make reservations on the computer, and we learned that each room has a number to identify it. Each child received an official training certificate and an adventure pack, and George also provided key cards and maps for our dramatic play.

Throughout the month we continued to explore these and other jobs through dramatic play. We transformed the lower loft into an office, with keyboards, phone, clipboards, and pens. This office evolved through many functions. It became a doctor's office, plumber's office, police department, detective agency, fire department, and hotel front desk. We used the keyboard to type out our names and other important information. We encouraged the children to stretch their writing and representation skills to create signs and other props for the office. When the upper loft functioned as our hotel, the children made room number signs so that the customers would know which room to go to.

Toward the end of the month we learned about letter carriers and the post office. We posed the question, "How does the letter carrier figure out where the mail should go?" We wrote a letter to Miss Theresa and figured out that it would need a

stamp, a name, and an address to be delivered. She joined us and read her letter, and we discovered that she knew just what we said because of the words we wrote! With some envelopes, a mailbox, and a mail bag, the children took this concept and ran with it. They wrote and delivered letters to each other and to their families. We wrote postcards to each child and our student letter carriers delivered them. If they did not recognize

a classmate's name, we encouraged them to use the attendance board to match the name and picture.

I have been putting off the inevitable so far in this article, but can do so no longer. This really is the final newsletter of the year, which means that soon our time together will be finished. We have all come to

love your wonderful children so, and we will miss them! It has been a privilege to watch them grow and to share their days. It is fitting to speak of community now, as we have watched this special group of children form their own supportive community. In addition to forming special friendships, they truly include everyone and help each other. We are so proud of them!

We would also like to thank you, the parents, for all your support this year. Thank you for the honor of entrusting us with your children. It has been a wonderful year.

News from the 4s class from Liz, Kim, and Melanie...

"Won't you take me to...Pizza Town!"

n April our fours class explored the concept of "community" by planning and creating our very own town. During this month-long project we learned about the people and places that make a town a nice place to live.

We mapped out the town's roads, grassy areas, and rivers and painted them on canvas. After that, we brainstormed the places our town should include. We used boxes, craft sticks, and cast-off recyclables to construct our town's buildings. We had toy stores, grocery stores, car washes, Target, a post office, a hot dog stand, and many other important establishments. We were overflowing with creativity and student-initiated writing!

Throughout the month we explored the concept of mapping. We looked at Google Maps' overhead views of Mt. Lebanon and Pittsburgh and plotted out our roads on canvas. Once they





were laid out, we posed the question of how we might be able to give directions from one place to another. We came around to the idea that each street would need a name, and each building on a street would need a number. We voted on street names for "Pizza Town" and created street signs. We also spent some time learning our own addresses. We had a lot of fun with a labeler, copying our addresses and watching as they magically printed onto labels for the houses we decorated.

Once we had our places set, we turned our attention toward people and their homes. Each child created a map of his/her home and used a variety of prints to illustrate the function and style of each room. We painted wooden houses to represent our homes and included them in our 3-D town display. We also



talked about the important people who work to make a community function. Each child chose a job in the context of Pizza Town

to serve an important purpose. Although we may not grow up to be garbage collectors, we recognize that it is an important function within the community. Besides, you get to drive a really cool truck! It is wonderful to me that young children do not judge the importance of a job by its salary or prestige, but rather by its importance (says the preschool teacher!).

We were thrilled to show off our learning and our creations at Open House. We love sharing our work with our families!

I have had the rare privilege of sharing two years with most of the children in this class. As we draw to a close I am struck by how much they have grown, and by the indelible mark they have made on my heart. I will miss them! Thank you for all your support throughout the year, and for the honor of working with your children.

wrapped package. It was from Dorothy Gale, a young girl from Kansas, who wrote that she had landed in a strange land. She asked us to use the gift in the package she sent as a way to please help figure out how she could get home again. We unwrapped the gift and included was a beautiful pop-up version of the book. We were entranced! It took us a little over a week, but we couldn't wait each day to hear the story to learn how to help Dorothy get home. We finally learned that the silver shoes she received from Glinda the Good held the answer. All Dorothy had to do was click them three times and wish for her home in Kansas. [In the book her shoes are silver, unlike the movie.]

We spent time learning more about tornadoes, and created a "tornado machine" out of plastic liter bottles, water, glitter and duct tape. It was fun to see how the funnel was created as we shook the bottle.

One of the most adorable characters of Oz, Toto, was brought to life as well. We turned the dramatic play room into a veterinarian's office and several of our favorite stuffed animals came from home to be "seen" by the vet. The children created a very realistic vet's office, which included a waiting room and homemade leashes for the pets. We also brought in a picture of our pet, or a picture of a pet we would like to have, to create the "This is my Toto" pictures that are gracing the hallway.

The Tin Man also provided inspiration for our learning as we learned more about our heart and the circulatory system. The vet's office became the doctor's office, complete with real stethoscopes. We listened to our heartbeats and learned about where to find our pulse. We created a DIY heart with plastic tubing, turkey basters and "Angry Birds" duct tape. :) I was so impressed because they suggested that I use blue-colored water as well as red-colored water to denote the difference between the veins and the arteries! We also took some time to look at the emotive side of the heart and talked about how our words and actions can hurt each other's hearts/feelings. We discussed the ways in which we could make sure to take care of our friends' hearts/feelings.

Throughout the whole month, we worked on creating our own puppet stage as well as different scenery backdrops along with our "Wizard of Oz" stick puppets. Our first installment was to draw a tornado similar to the one that swept up Dorothy's house. We also used bubble wrap to create the most beautiful



picture of poppies similar to the field of poppies Dorothy, Scarecrow, Tin Man and the Lion walked through on their way to the Emerald City. We brought this together for Open House and shared our journey through Oz with our families!


In our last weeks of school, we will be enjoying the great outdoors as a backdrop for learning. I'm calling this month "We are Blooming" because we are truly blossoming every day!

The children really got their creative juices going in April as we put together electric houses. The wiring was a significant small-motor challenge, but they soldiered through and were delighted by the bright results. We painted, glued, and constructed furniture, all from materials the children collected from home, recyclables, and some Mushroom art supplies. The final touch was a creature to live in our house: of course it had to be a "Mushroom Mouse," a colorful cat toy.

This project allowed the children to be creative, solve problems, observe cause and effect, and participate in a long-term effort that required patience and planning.
